From ATO to POW to FTC, Swindle Learns Value of Brotherhood

Orson Swindle '59, now serves as a Commissioner on the Federal Trade Commission. Below are short versions of his answers to a few questions.

Why did you join Alpha Tau Omega?

I guess the primary reason was that a couple of my friends from my high school days—one was a year ahead of me, and one was two years ahead of me—were members of ATO. And, I was from a small town, so when you go to a big town like Atlanta, you're looking for friends, so I think my inclination was to go with those that I knew. **B. W. Hughes '57** was from Camilla, GA and we played football together. [**D.**] **Conner Collins '58** was also from Camilla, and we had played football and basketball together, so I went with them. I didn't know a lot about fraternities, so that's how I made the decision.

With whom do you stay in contact?
