Alumni Profile HA With Joel Cowan '58

Can you just tell me about your beginnings, I read that you grew up in Cartersville and your father was the mayor when you were a kid?

The way I see it, there is nothing more important than local politics, and growing up with my father as a small town mayor gave me a leg up on everyone else because I knew a lot from my father's experiences..

What made you decide on Georgia Tech?

I had a number of friends from home who were going to go to Georgia Tech. In addition, my brother was at Georgia Tech and I'd been to Tech multiple times in high school and really liked the environment, I definitely preferred the big city environment to the small town environment I was from.

Why did you choose Industrial Management when you were at Georgia Tech?

I was not interested in engineering but general business and real estate. There were no real estate courses and IM was the closest I could come.

Why did you decide on AT Ω ? What was AT Ω like when you were here?

As I stated earlier my brother went to Georgia Tech and he was a Sigma Chi, but I had a few friends from home who were AT Ω 's so I rushed and liked it. I'd say the major differences between when I was there and now are probably the pledgeship and the different layout of the house. I'm sure our pledgeship was a much harder routine than that of today. The biggest difference in the house between now and then was that we used to have our meals cooked for us downstairs and then sent up to us on the dumb waiter.

How did you get started? I read an article that talked about you coming up with the idea for Peachtree City with the father of another Beta lota when you were only a junior? Can you tell us about that?

One morning I was eating breakfast with another one of my fraternity brothers, Peter Knox III, and I read in the newspaper that his dad was planning on starting a city. Given my past interests, I asked him if his father needed a mayor

for the new town. Some time later he told me his dad would be in town and he wanted to have lunch with me. We met and had an instant relationship which led to my managing the start of the project part time while finishing school. While the project had severe financial challenges, even affecting my pay, it was an affair of the heart from the start.

I've read a lot of stuff about you having an intense interest in working to better the environment from the ground up, by changing where and how people live rather than working to counter the effects of people's transportation behaviors... How did you come up with the idea to work backwards to solve this massive crisis we are dealing with today?

Peachtree City was to be a model city from the start and I promoted it as such. Then Governor Carter appointed me as Chair of a growth commission. Governor Harris asked me to head the Growth Strategies Commission which created the Georgia Planning Act which was the standard for many years. I was the GRTA (Georgia Regional Transportation Authority) founding chairman, where we worked to come up with administrative standards which introduced land use to improve traffic as well as protect the environment. I also was the founding chairman of the Metro/North Georgia Planning District, which developed a macro plan for managing and allocating North Georgia's water resources. Most of my work has been trying to improve land use patterns to enhance the ultimate quality of life. It was always very "leading edge" and not easily accepted of course.

What were some of the biggest challenges associated with starting Peachtree City?

One thing we had against us from the start was money. The truth was that it was never properly funded and couldn't even pay me initially. Producing the vision and plan to attract the funding without those resources required a lot of "invention." It was strange watching my fraternity brothers and other friends graduate from college with jobs that were with large established companies and instantly start making money. It

was a major challenge to prove to others that this goal was actually feasible, we had doubters from the start, but looking back on it, I'd say we proved them wrong.

What do you do on a day-to-day basis?

I work a lot with non-profit organizations, especially dealing with people in Central Asia. In addition, I've got a company working in the Netherlands, Ireland, and currently expanding into China, Brazil, and the US, that provides a sophisticated minute by minute tracking system to help save on fuel and maintenance cost, and to increase overall logistical efficiency.

Who were the most influential people in your life that helped you get where you are today?

Pete Knox definitely gave me wide berth; he was a dreamer and a visionary and after conceiving a project and direction, let you sink or swim. My father instilled the values that economic development and education made the greatest contribution to raising the living standards for working people.

What advice would you give to the Beta lota's of today to help give us an edge on everyone else as far as recognizing our potential in the future?

Take every opportunity you can to meet people who are doing things and make connections that will serve you well years down the road. Meet executives and soak up the environment and information around you. I'd say one thing guys need to start doing is attending the free lectures here at Tech by some of the most influential business leaders in the world. It seems like a total waste when you have a powerful business executive coming to talk to college students and no one shows up.

What is it like to hear people talk about driving on Joel Cowan Parkway in Peachtree City?

In all honesty, I don't think people should have roads named after them while they're still living. If anything it just makes me more cautious than normal; it would be pretty humiliating to get a ticket on a road named after myself.
