'He Was a Natural Leader and the Coolest Guy in the World, with a Great Sense of Humor'

A Tribute to Jack Wilson '61, from Three Men Who Knew Him Well

Jack Wilson '61 is remembered as a business leader who was deeply involved in civic concerns, and a devoted family man. He was also a good friend and brother, and a proud member of Alpha Tau Omega. He passed away on December 5, 2005, of Alzheimer's disease at age 66.

As an undergraduate, Jack served a year as worthy master of the Beta Iota Chapter. His fraternity experience "helped him discover and sharpen his leadership skills, which stood him in good stead for the rest of his life," says his brother **Bill Wilson '64**. Jack was also in the Interfraternity Council and played varsity baseball for three years, reaching the NCAA regionals one year, Bill says.

A Conversation with Bert Thornton '68 about ATO, the Fraternity Experience and Finding a Mentor

'I Don't Know One Successful Person Who Didn't Have a Mentor'

Bert Thornton '68 is president and COO of Waffle House. Mr. Thornton — who enjoys playing golf; hunting deer, elk and birds; and saltwater fishing — prefers spending the bulk of his free time relaxing with his wife and three daughters. He has also been active with the Georgia Tech Foundation, Georgia Tech Alumni Association and other organizations through Tech. 1960, when Jack was chapter president and Ennis was a pledge. "I thought he was the coolest guy in the world. He was extraordinarily

capable and articulate, and a natural leader. He was very active and visible on campus," Ennis says of his longtime friend and former big brother in ATO.

"I have many warm memories of him at the fraternity house," he says. "Jack was pleasant to everybody.

He had a great sense of humor and enjoyed practical jokes."

Dick Johnston '62, who met Jack in 1958, recalls, "The fraternity then was very close. Jack was one of the strongest influences of that

group. He was skilled in leadership and was very genuine. He had a lot of fun but kept everything in balance."

"Leader" and "leadership" are words that come up often in any discussion about Jack Wilson. After he earned his bachelor's degree in industrial management on a Navy ROTC scholarship, he served a three-year tour in the Navy, stationed in Japan as a supply officer. Then he studied at Harvard Business School and received his MBA in the late 1960s. The Georgia native eventually became one of the top commercial real estate developers in Florida, after founding The Wilson Company in Tampa in 1980.

He was instrumental in numerous major office and rental-apartment building projects and was prominently involved in community affairs, even volunteering as chairman of the Tampa Bay Super Bowl XXXV Task Force in 2000-01, leading the effort to raise money

from the local business community to bring the Super Bowl to Tampa.

He had a life-long interest in sports, and had also led the push to secure county financing to construct Raymond James Stadium in Tampa and was a primary force in constructing Legends Field, a minor-league facility for the New York Yankees.

Jack also served terms heading local economic development organizations such as the Greater Tampa Chamber of Commerce, the Tampa Bay Partnership and the Westshore Alliance (which he cofounded). In 2001, he was welcomed into the Tampa Bay Business Hall of Fame.

He and his wife Carolyn had four children — two sons and two daughters. A son and a daughter now work at The Wilson Company.

Bill says Jack was exceptionally devoted

to his family, even as a boy. "When we were growing up, and he and his friends were doing things, he allowed me to be part of the group. Even though I was two years younger, I was always included," he says.

"Jack was very caring," Bill adds. "He and I talked regularly over the years. He was always available and interested and offered input on whatever was going on in my life." Discussing Jack's life, though, was often a challenge, since he was very modest, says Bill. "I didn't know about half his business accomplishments until I read about them on his company's Web site." "He had a remarkable ability to set a standard of behavior that other people wanted to emulate," says Ennis Parker, who likewise served a term as chapter president, in part due to being inspired by Jack. "He was very sharp, a great friend and a warm human being."

Dick Johnston asks, "Is leadership innate or is it developed? I believe the skills must be there, and then the opportunity must be taken for them to be honed. Jack took that opportunity and made the most of it. I am left with two strong impressions of Jack's life: leadership and character. I worked with Jack in chapter leadership positions, the IFC and the Ramblin' Wreck Club. It was clear Jack always exhibited the highest character. It is also clear to me that he was a true leader even in those days.

"The influence of his character will be continued through his wife and children."

pedestal-ized like they are today. All students had the same goal: to get an education. I joined a fraternity, like many of the athletes, to expand my horizons and surround myself with good people. ATO played a huge role in my life in terms of values. We had an exceptional group of brothers with great values and work ethics. So, for me, that became the norm. I have enjoyed the benefits of that early association with those brothers and still enjoy it today.

Do you think everyone could benefit from the same type of experiences ATO offered you?

Yes. The broader your college experience, the better. The contacts you make in college are the contacts you'll enjoy for the rest of your life. They form the basis for a life and business network that will be so valuable later. I would not be here without ATO.

What one piece of advice would you give the new brothers at ATO?

Life is not about one piece of advice. Find a mentor. A mentor helps you form the social and political aspects of your life. I know a lot of successful people, and I don't know one who didn't have a mentor at some point. Find the right mentor who can give you all the right advice to be successful. The more respected your mentor is, the greater your chances of success.

Who was your mentor?

I have had a couple of them: my father, Lib Julian (former Waffle House COO) and **Joe Rogers Jr. '65**. They have done an outstanding job for me.
