#### Giving Back to ATO from the Day He Graduated to the Day He Died

Whether Bonded by Blood or Fraternal Ties, Many Have Fond Remembrances of Jack Hamilton

To say that the ATO was a big part of the life of **William "Jack" Hamilton '66** would be a drastic understatement. An ATO himself, Jack also had an uncle and two sons, **Jamie '93** and **Justin '95**, who were members of the fraternity. In addition, his wife Judy, who attended Emory University, was an ATO Sweetheart.

"My dad loved ATO," says Jamie. "When I went to Georgia Tech, he encouraged me to pledge—not necessarily ATO, but he had his hopes, of course! He told me that Tech is a difficult school and you can get run down by the courses and workload. Without the brotherhood, it would be really hard to get through."

In fact, Jack truly believed that he would not have made it through his time at Tech if it weren't for the love and support of his ATO brothers. He felt that some of the best memories he made in his life were made at Georgia Tech, and he carried many of the friendships he made there throughout his life. Men who started off as fraternity brothers became business acquaintances and clients and helped to make Jack the success that he was later in life.

His pledge brother **Med Walstad '66** is one of these lifelong friends. "Jack was just a good person," he says. "He was always upbeat; I can't think of a time when Jack was down. He was always smiling, always friendly, and genuinely glad to see you whenever he saw you. He was a good friend, and I think about him frequently."

John Mills '67, another fraternity brother and former roommate of Jack, knew Jack and Judy since high school. Their children were very close in age, and the men crossed paths throughout the years at various social occasions and at the Atlanta Athletic Club, which John

became a member of through Jack.

John echoes Med's views of Jack: "Jack was one of the truest, kindest, most honest human beings I've ever dealt with. There was never a finer guy around than Jack; he was a great one. If you needed

something, you could call him. If he thought you needed something, he'd offer. But he'd do everything he could for himself before he'd ask for help. Jack gave, he never took. It is a real tragedy that someone as good as Jack is no longer with us." Jack extended these feelings of giving back to the fraternity that he felt had given so much to him. "ATO was a tremendous part of his life," says Jamie. "He and my mother dated all through school, and the majority of his wedding party was made up of fraternity brothers. The fraternity was so close to his heart, so he gave back—from the day he graduated right up to the day he died."

He and Judy, who belonged to the fraternity's Mothers' Club, would come to the house and provide meals for Saturday home football games. Jack served on the alumni board and spearheaded a capital campaign that was instrumental in renovating the house.

After graduating from Tech, Jack served in Vietnam and was awarded the bronze star in 1968. He then attended the Woodrow Wilson College of Law, after which he began an extremely successful career in commercial real estate. Not only was Jack a member of the Atlanta Commercial Board of Realtors Million Dollar Club, but he also received the club's Phoenix Award for qualifying for the club by producing at least a million dollars in real estate transactions each year for 10 years. He formed two of his own companies, Capital Investments and Hamilton Commercial Realty, Inc.

Jack died on July 12, 2007 and is survived by his wife Judy and three sons, Jody, Jamie and Justin.

On behalf of the entire brotherhood, we will miss you, Jack, but we won't forget you.
