Ensuring the Beta lota Legacy at 205 Fourth Street Update on Our Major Renovation and Improvement Effort

Our last issue of the *Gazette* described progress of our \$1.5 million Capital Campaign to make improvements at the House and put the Beta Iota Corporation on sound footing for the future. We are continuing to work hard at this. Our recent activity includes:

- We are finalizing a team of Era Captains and Class Agents and are meeting via conference calls to plan and conduct our fund-raising efforts.
- ✓ We have begun efforts to create a "Leadership Circle" of Brothers who can support our efforts in a substantial way in terms of gifts and campaign direction. We know that we need to get halfway home before we begin general solicitation of our alumni brotherhood of around 1.300.
- ✓ We have secured pledges from the entire active chapter, totaling \$33,000 from 65 undergraduates, payable over 5 years upon graduation. The young men have stepped up and really supported what we are trying to accomplish.
- ✓ We have secured a total of over \$330,000 in pledges and gifts during this "silent phase"

We have worked hard to create a sound plan for the future so that we can come back in years to come to a safe, comfortable and well-maintained house. Here's the plan in a nutshell:

- ✓ Fix Known Living/Life Safety Issues
- Install a fire sprinkler system (a requirement of the National fraternity)
- Overhaul our HVAC systems and put them under a professional maintenance program
- Address bathroom, roof, reequip and redecorate living and study areas
- ✓ Overhaul Our Finances
- Eliminate our debt burden—plow funds into ongoing/capital maintenance
- Establish a capital maintenance account
- Reset room rents and agreements to reflect current campus realities
- ✓ Install Routine Maintenance Systems with Inspections and Action Accountability
- This would include Chapter/Board of Trustees walkthroughs with corrective actions and follow-up
- Address situations when they arrive using Capital Maintenance and Chapter Budget dollars

We will continue to update you as we go along.



ALUMNI PROFILE

From Beta Iota President to Entrepreneur of the Year, Tom Noonan '83 Recaps His Successful Career

ATO is Where Noonan and Many Other Brothers "Learned About Life"

Tom Noonan '83 had ties to Georgia Tech from a very young age. After his parents graduated from medical school in Chicago, they relocated to Atlanta. They moved right on to Tech's campus to Cherry Street, directly across from Rose Bowl field. His father took him to all of the football and basketball games, and he also was an usher at Grant Field during his Cub Scout days.

Eventually Tom became a student at Tech himself. He recalls his days as an undergrad and as a brother in ATO as being full of great memories.

"Hindsight is always 20/20, but it is clear to me that the bonds made in the fraternity are bonds that last for life," Tom says. "The ATO experience taught me a lot about life in general and I believe that I benefitted from it immensely."

He remembers some of the memorable times he had in the fraternity alongside some of the people who would become lifelong friends.

"I did not always use good judgment in those days, but had a lot of fun and learned a lot about life," Tom says. "Some of the fond memories that I have include building the Hawaiian Party structure and throwing the best party on campus, pledge pranks, igniting a 6000 firecracker brick in Frank Dixon's bed, summers with the brothers in Myrtle Beach...and Moose's balloon launcher from the roof of the house!"

While Tom definitely spent a lot of time bonding with his fellow brothers, he also knew when it was time to get down to business. He served multiple leadership positions within the fraternity including president, treasurer and secretary.

"I had jobs of responsibility that had to be performed well to ensure the ongoing operation and success of our chapter," Tom says.

Holding those offices on the executive

board taught Tom a lot about responsibility and the value of hard work.

"It taught me about teamwork, achievement, establishing goals and plans, budgets, and all of those things that turn a wily bunch of free spirits into a strong team," Tom says.

These attributes all eventually contributed to his immense success in the business world post-Georgia Tech.

Following graduation, Tom immediately moved to Milwaukee, WI to work for Rockwell Automation and has "been on the run ever since." After completing Rockwell training, he moved to Boston. While in Boston, Tom worked for Rockwell, earned his business degree from Harvard University, married his college sweetheart Kim, started two technology companies, and welcomed his first child Tommy into the world.

Soon after the birth of his son, Tom moved back to Atlanta where he took the vice president position at Dun and Bradstreet Software. During that time he and Kim had two more children, Caroline and Marshall, and he spent a year commuting back and forth between Atlanta and New York. This commute eventually led to his resignation from D&B and starting up his own company, Internet Security Systems (ISS). ISS soon expanded to include over 2,500 employees and grossed \$400 million in revenue. 13 years later, Tom sold ISS to IBM for \$1.6 billion and eventually retired in May 2008.

While this is quite a lengthy list of successes, it is far from the whole story for Tom. Throughout his career he was recognized by *Forbes*, *Business Week*, and *Fortune* magazines, appointed to serve on the National Infrastructure Advisory Council (NIAC) by Former President Bush, and named "Entrepreneur of the Year" by Ernst and Young.

"The Entrepreneur of the Year Award is a great honor and something I am very proud of," Tom says. "It takes much more than a good idea to be a successful entrepreneur...for me it signifies what can



be achieved when you recruit, motivate, and build a great group of individuals into a world class team that executes."

Even with his hectic career and now busy retirement that includes competing in ocean sailing and super-yacht races along with quail hunting, skiing, and golfing, Tom still finds time to assist the Beta Iota chapter.

"Practically, I learned as treasurer 25 years ago that you cannot maintain and support the capital needs of a 100-year old structure that houses 65 young men each year with the operating dues generated from active members," Tom says. "I give to Beta Iota because it gave so much to me and [because of] the lifelong friendships that began in that house 25 years ago."

His advice to future generations of ATO brothers is to make the most of the precious time you have in college and as an active fraternity member.

"Your time is limited, don't waste it living in the shadow of someone else's dream," Tom says. "Too many people live in fear of their own potential. Have fun... and more important, have the courage to follow your heart and intuition. Everything else is secondary."

It is clear that Tom did just that, and he has a lifetime of accomplishments to show for his ability to work as a team member and attention to detail. He is a true representation of what it means to be a brother of Alpha Tau Omega.
